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# Update on the Strategic Plan

With a great deal of thoughtful input from the advisory board and Centre faculty, staff, and scholars, Brett has crafted the concise and tightly focussed document found in the information package accompanying this report. This final version begins with a brief preamble outlining the Centre's strengths and the challenge we have set ourselves, moves on to four detailed planning principles, and then describes the plan, which consists of four clearly stated commitments, accompanying activities that will help us accomplish our goals, and measurement indicators to monitor our progress. A concluding paragraph acknowledges key enablers, without whom none of this could happen.

# ▲ Top Co-op Issues 2016

In fall 2015, the Centre canvassed Canada's co-op leaders, including CEOs and managers, board members and academics, on their views about the top issues currently facing co-operative organizations. Our forty-six key informants were remarkably consistent in identifying their most pressing concerns, which we have organized under themes that include access to capital, governance, member commitment, youth engagement, and public awareness of the co-op model.

The poster found here itemizes the top twelve themes and highlights the top three issues, including respondents' suggestions for action.

# Graduate Certificate in the Social Economy and Co-operatives

Our new master's certificate was offered for the first time beginning in September 2015 and has generated considerable interest. Not even a year into the program, we're already developing an innovative new delivery method to make it accessible to more students and working professionals across the country and around the world. The new blended-delivery model, with both online and in-person courses, will be offered in September 2016. With classes taught by Centre Fellows, the certificate is offered through our affiliate, the Johnson Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy. # Online Repository of Teaching Materials about Co-ops

We have a new web page devoted to online teaching resources on co-operatives. Currently there are videos of seminars, lectures, and special presentations, as well as case studies and Centre booklets, all freely available for downloading. We are working on a case study series and more of these will become available as they are completed. In addition, the historical survey on co-op films produced by the National Film Board of Canada compiled by Centre colleague George Melnyk

of the University of Calgary will also be posted here, along with excerpts from some of the films. The online resources page is under development and we invite you to watch for new links to a variety of additional materials.

# ▲ Impact of Co-op Teaching and Learning

Recent data collected by the Centre demonstrates our ability to reach hundreds of students on the University of Saskatchewan campus and introduce them to the key ideas and concepts fundamental to understanding co-operatives. From September 2013 to April 2016, approximately 866 students received classroom instruction that would give them a basic understanding of co-operatives and the role they play in society. Of these 866 students, 107 were graduate students and 759 were undergraduates.

An important factor in the impact of our teaching is the large number of project-based learning opportunities we provide in addition to course work. Since September 2013, 41 students have been involved in comprehensive co-op research projects supervised by U of S professors through thesis work, major projects, MBA consulting projects, and research assistantships. Centre fellows supervised thirty-six of the projects.

We have also created many opportunities for students to learn about co-ops beyond courses and project-based learning, hosting or co-hosting almost thirty events with students and life-long learners in mind. In addition, we work hard to integrate our seminars into the Johnson Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy's (JSGS) course requirements, exposing many JSGS students to leading co-op thinkers. We also support the participation of students at conferences and workshops, which allows for interactions with practitioners and gives students meaningful insight into real-world co-op issues.

Finally, books, journal articles, reports, presentations, video seminars, and other pieces written by Centre fellows are used across Canada and around the world and have enormous impact in the teaching realm beyond the classroom.

# ▲ Thematic Breakdown of Selected Centre Activity

The Centre for the Study of Co-operatives has at the core of its mission the creation of new knowledge about co-operatives. New knowledge is created in the minds of people: faculty, students, officials of co-operatives and the public sector, and others, who experience our events, activities, and initiatives in person and through various media. The Centre's discovery mission is currently concentrated in the areas of co-operative governance, co-operative development, rural and agricultural communities, and Indigenous co-operation. The following sections provide more depth on these four areas.

Governance is a critical determinant of the success or failure of organizations. Informed by the study of co-operatives and their distinctive issues, the Centre is producing a new synthesis of knowledge and theory about governance. This involves three elements: developing governance and organizational theory and publishing it in international forums to influence scholars and students of governance; applying theory to co-operatives and providing leaders with new insights into governance; and conducting case studies of co-operative governance.

The Centre's emerging approach views governance as the allocation of power within organizations and among stakeholders — governance is a basic question of the purpose of an organization and how it is conceptualized. Allocation of power through governance enables organizations to address three fundamental categories of problems: strategic interdependencies among stakeholders (co-operation and co-ordination among members, directors, managers, etc.); establishing a shared way of thinking to deal with an uncertain future; and maintaining legitimacy.

# **Co-operative Development** → including community and social engagement, measurement of impact, ethics, history, innovation, sustainability

The development of new co-operatives is a complex and sometimes mysterious process, and one that in the long run is important for the renewal of the co-operative sector. The teachings and lore of the co-operative movement indicate that co-ops are formed by voluntary associations of people, usually at a local level, who want to address a need by forming an enterprise. At the same time, history shows that co-ops do not emerge everywhere they could, but in patterns and clusters — often connected with a citizens' or social movement, sponsorship by pre-existing co-operatives, and/or action by the state. Some thrive more than others. The Centre discovers new knowledge about co-op development, and creates learning opportunities for students and leaders, by exploring how different factors work together to produce successful co-op development. The Centre's approach involves a strong focus on understanding community needs, capacity, and leadership, and on identifying the specific kinds of interventions that can promote self-help. We look for the best, proven insights from around the world and for ways these can be adapted and applied in Canada and elsewhere.

The Co-operative Innovation Project (CIP), which investigated co-operative business development in rural and Aboriginal communities in Canada, concluded in December 2015. Funded with \$1 million from Federated Co-operatives Limited (FCL) on behalf of the Co-operative Retailing System, the project provided a unique opportunity to help rural and Aboriginal communities determine whether the co-op model could be applied as a practical solution to needs identified by the communities themselves. CIP personnel made more than thirty community visits and through online and telephone surveys contacted another 649 communities throughout western Canada gathering data for the final report on this phase of the project. The final report is on the CIP website (https://coopinnovation.word-press.com) as are the community reports and a variety of two-page briefs.

In January 2016, based on the success of the CIP project, FCL announced an additional \$5 million over five years to fund **Co-operatives First**, a nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the lives of people in rural and First Nations, Metis and Inuit communities in western Canada, using the co-operative model. This is a stand-alone enterprise, though research management will remain at the Centre with Darcy Overland. The Centre's education and liaison officer, Audra Krueger, has accepted the position of executive director and CIP personnel Kyle White and Merle Massie will transition to Co-ops First when it's fully functional in June 2016.

# **Indigenous**

The development and empowerment of Indigenous communities in Canada and elsewhere is one of the great societal challenges of our time. The Centre aims to contribute by investigating the synergies or tensions between co-operative forms of enterprise and First Nations, Métis, and Inuit social-economic realities and models of governance and power. Centre faculty and students advance knowledge in these areas by empirical studies of the breadth and diversity of enterprises in Aboriginal communities; by engagement partnerships with First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities and organizations to produce mutually beneficial knowledge; and by learning from Indigenous world views to identify ways Western organizational models have been based on limited understandings and can be broadened.

In October 2015 she was the external examiner of six MA theses, and in mid-May 2016 she made an in-person site visit to meet with faculty and review programs and marking; she is also a member of the examinations committee.

Centre fellows act as supervisors and/or serve on committees for 25 graduate students.

And in addition to their day-to-day commitments, Centre faculty and staff together serve on approximately 50 committees, boards, and/or professional and community organizations.


